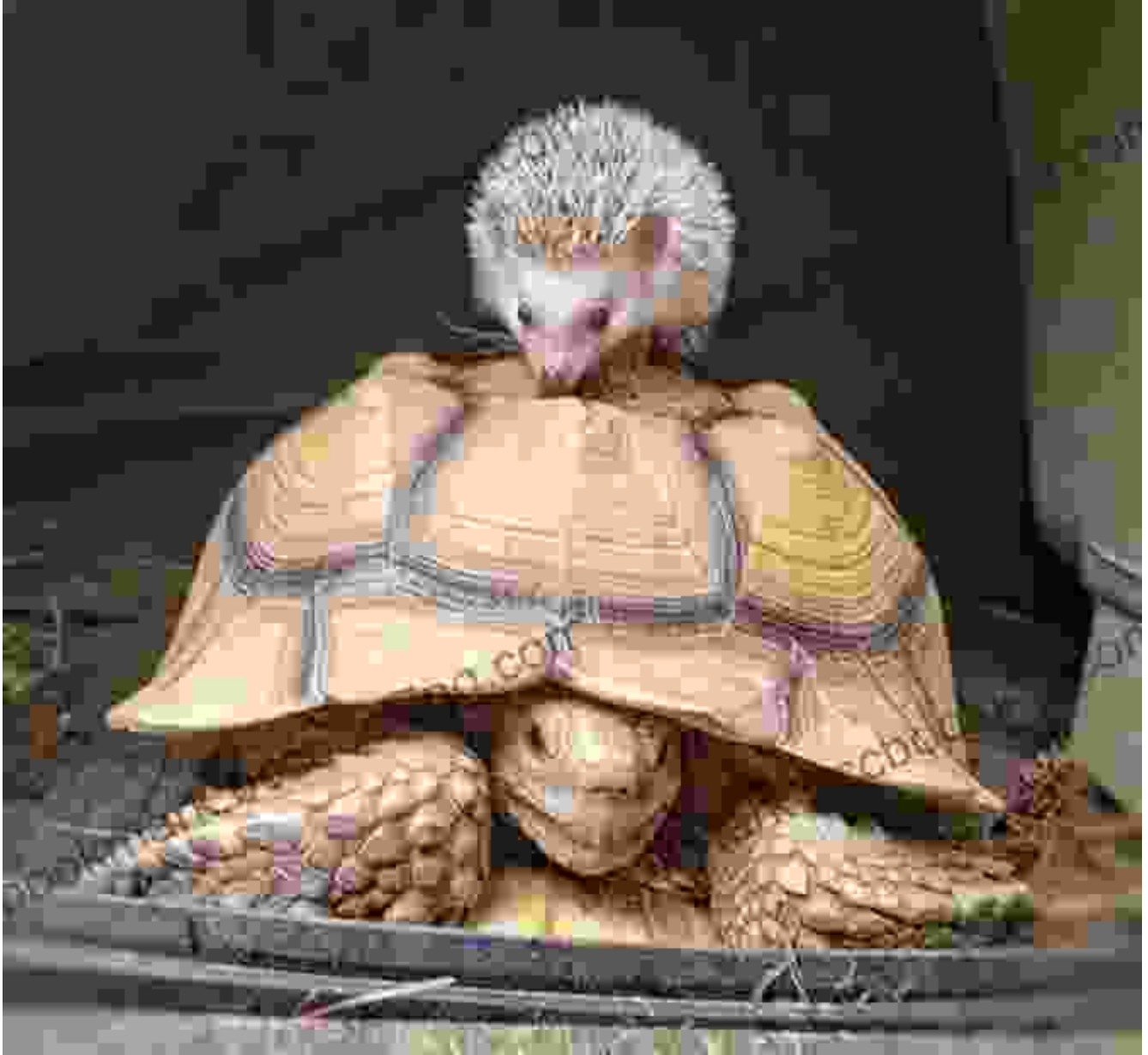


Alfonso and the Prickly Visitor: A Royal Tortoise Tale

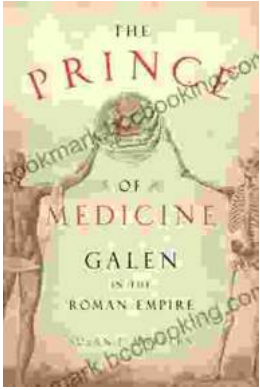
